This week, I'd like you to write a story about going into space! Think about Neil Armstrong's journey to the Moon. The story can be as long as you'd like or you can write a short story with a few sentences.

Before you start writing you'll need to plan your story. You'll need a beginning, a problem that your astronauts will face, how your astronauts solve the problem and then an ending.

You'll need an introduction, so think about who your characters are, why they are going into space, and where are they are going to.

Mr Dente's top-tip! Can you use some expanded noun phrases to describe your rocket? What sounds can you hear as you blast off? Can you use an adverb to describe how you took off into space?

What is the astronaut's problem? What goes wrong for your astronauts? Could the engines break when they're in space, do they meet angry aliens, encounter fireballs or do they crash land on a planet?

Then you'll need to think of how they can solve their problem so they can get back home to Earth. But can you think of an interesting twist-ending?

- Remember to use your best handwriting, exclamation marks, capital letters and full stops.
- Can you use commas in a list?
- Think about how you can make it as exciting as possible for the person reading it.

Once you have written your story, I'd like you to call someone you've not seen in a while and read your story to them!

- If your space story was a book, can you create a front cover for your story? Remember to give your story a title and include the author's name!
- Can you draw pictures of the characters in your story?
- Can you draw a picture of your Rocket?
