<u>Topic</u>

<u>Art</u>

You may recognise the symbol below as the Olympics logo. The five interlaced rings (blue, yellow, black, green and red) represent the five continents of the world, united by Olympism, while the six colours are those that appear on all the national flags of the world at the present time.

Your challenge this week is to recreate the Olympic symbol using whichever materials you would like. This may be a drawing or something that you make.

<u>PE</u>

The Wacky Olympics - Make up your own hilarious Olympic-themed games.

For an Olympic ring toss, make five rings by cutting a circle out of the centres of five paper plates, then paint them in the five Olympic colours. Toss the rings onto empty paper-towel or wrapping-paper tubes that are standing upright.

You could also make Olympic torches out of construction paper cones and tissue paper flames then have a relay race passing the torch.
