
Dear Year 3,

<u>Topic</u>

Here is a diagram of a volcano, like one you might find in Japan!




You can either print out the diagram below or draw and label your own volcano.

<u>English</u>

You have travelled to Japan to see the Olympics this year! I would like you to send a postcard home to your family telling them what you have been doing and how you feel.

(If you have a printer, you can use the template at the end of this document).


You will need:

- An address of the person you are sending your postcard to. Ask an adult for your home address and how you would write this on the postcard.
- To have the name of who you are sending it to. E.g. 'To Mum', 'To Dad', 'To Ben' at the beginning.
- To have your name. E.g. 'from Miss Blakeley', at the end.
- Include details telling the person what you have been doing.
- Ask some questions about what they've been getting up to.
- Include some expanded noun phrases and good adjectives in your description.

<u>Maths</u>

In this week's maths challenge grid you will find something we haven't yet covered in Year 3. A 2D shape is symmetrical if a line can be drawn through it so that either side of the line looks exactly the same.

Look at the shape. If you folded it on the line, would the shape be equal on each side?



<u>Art/Design</u>

Japan can be a beautiful place. Their buildings have a wooden style, are usually elevated off the ground and have tiled or thatched roofs. Japan is also well known for its cherry blossom trees.

Have a go at drawing or painting your own Japanese inspired landscape. See examples below.
