

What can we learn from religions about deciding what is right and what is wrong?


Re-cap on last weeks learning.

- When in the story are Adam and Eve tempted?
- What do you think the story is saying about temptation?
- Who does Adam blame?
- Who does Eve blame?
- Do you think making excuses and blaming others is a good thing?
- In the story, Adam and Eve say sorry for eating the fruit. Do you think a Christian or a Jew might learn something about saying sorry from this story?
- What important things does the story tell Jewish and Christian people about human beings and how they behave?
