




The Incredible Internet

With your partner, write down as many things as you can think of that people use the Internet for.




Mobile Devices



The amazing world of technology now means that people can go online wherever they are, using any mobile device they have access to.

Some children have their own mobile phone or tablet, others might be allowed to use their parent's or carer's or older sibling's device.

Whether using your own device or one you have borrowed, it is important that you know how to look after it, keep it safe and use it responsibly.



Mobile Devices



Mobile phones and other devices are expensive, so we need to take care of them.

How can we take care of our mobile devices?

Keep them somewhere safe, keep them in a protective case and be careful not to spill anything on them.

Never take someone else's phone or device without their permission and only lend your devices to those you trust, with your parents' or carers' permission.



Mobile Devices



How can we make sure others don't have access to our devices?

Just as we keep our passwords safe for emails and accounts we use on our computers, we need to keep our passcodes for mobile devices private so our friends cannot use them without our permission.

What should you do if your mobile device gets lost or stolen?

If you lose your mobile device or have it stolen, you need to tell a trusted adult straight away.



Mobile Devices



Some research suggests that it might not be good for our health to use mobile devices for too long or too often.

Some children have their own mobile phone or tablet, others might be allowed to use their parent's or carer's or older sibling's device.

We can suffer from eye strain if we have been using a device for a long time and this could cause headaches.

Some research suggests that people can feel sad or worried about their life or their appearance when they have spent a lot of time looking online, especially on social media sites.

Mobile Devices



When we use mobile devices, we need to remember to use them responsibly.

We mustn't leave our mobile device somewhere where it could easily be stolen.



We must never take a photo or video of someone if they do not want us to.

We must not dial numbers we don't know, make prank calls, or dial 999 if there is no emergency.



Zip It, Block It, Flag It



Whatever device you use to go online, it is important that you know how to look after it and how to look after yourself.

The phrase 'zip it, block it, flag it' is simple and easy to remember. It covers everything you need to stay safe when using the Internet on any device. These useful guidelines also apply to using gaming sites where you can chat to others online.



Zip It, Block It, Flag It



Zip It!

'Zip it' means not talking! OK, so of course you are going to talk on a chat site but you really need to think carefully about what you say and the information you share.

Never give away your real name, your address, the name of the school you go to or details about clubs you attend.

Zip It, Block It, Flag It



When you see something online that doesn't seem right, you need to act responsibly.



Block It!

Block and delete emails from anyone you don't know.

Never open attachments from unknown sources – they could contain a nasty virus!



If someone says, posts or sends anything unkind or inappropriate to you, block them and tell a trusted adult. This applies to emails, text messages and all forms of online communication, including social media and online gaming.

Zip It, Block It, Flag It



It is important to flag up anything that isn't right. Tell a trusted adult about what you have seen or what has happened and they can help. This could be a parent or carer, or someone at school.

Flag it!

You need to flag:

cyberbullying;

someone you don't know, or that you have met online, asking to meet you in person;

anything that upsets, scares or worries you;

anything you think might be illegal.



The Right to Privacy



What does privacy mean?

Privacy means keeping things private or confidential.

Privacy means not sharing something, such as certain information, with others.


Let's take a look at the answers together.

Is it OK to post your address online to a friend you know from school?

This is a bad idea as the Internet is not private.

You might post your address to your friend on a social network but their privacy settings might mean that others can see it.

If you need to give your address to your friend, it would be better to ask your parents or carers to share the information, send it in a text message, or write it down on a piece of paper and give it to them.



The Right to Privacy

Let's take a look at the answers together.

Is it OK to put a photo of your friend online, that you took on your phone?

It is not OK to post a photo of someone online without their permission.

If you take a photo of someone and they want you to delete it, you must respect their wish and respect their privacy.

You wouldn't want someone to post a photo of you online without your consent, so don't do it to someone else.



The Right to Privacy

Let's take a look at the answers together.

Is it OK for your parent or carer to put a photo of you in your school uniform online, with your name underneath it?

This isn't a good idea and it's OK to tell your parent or carer that you do not want a picture of you shared on social media that shows your face, where you go to school and what your name is.

Once a photo has been shared online, it can never be properly deleted.

A photo like this would share too much personal information that you wouldn't want a stranger knowing.

The person you think of as a friend might be someone who should not be trusted, pretending to be your age and to share your interests.

Unfortunately, not everyone is who they say they are online.

It is not a good idea to give them a photo of yourself.
