Task

Yesterday, you should have produced a planning document based on our recent visit to Murton Park. Today and tomorrow, your task is to write a recount on our school trip. Your recount should between 1 and 2 pages long and should include the key features previously looked at.

As a reminder I have included the key features below:

- 1. Past tense
- 2. First person
- 3. Time conjunctions
- 4. Quotations (direct speech)
- 5. Introduction (brief overview including who, what, where, when and why)
- 6. Key facts based on what happened
- 7. Conclusion summarising how it went and any final thoughts

I can use past tense consistently well and can include a conclusion which summaries how the day went. I can also use a range of sentence types in my writing too including simple, compound and complex sentences.		

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
