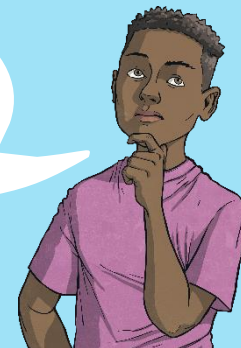

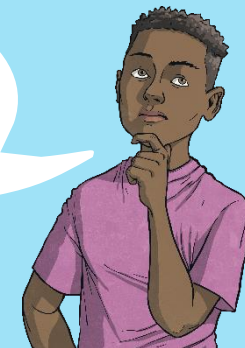

What you will be doing this week.

You are going to plan your leaflets today and then create them at the end of the week. You are creating a leaflet for your area of Glaytonbury. Think about what people will see when they get to your area and what will people do when in your area of Glaytonbury.

What to include in your leaflet:

- The front of your leaflet will need a title and image.
- The inside will need text boxes and images informing the guests what they will find and what they can do at your area.
- The back page could be a map of the whole of Glaytonbury.

What is the purpose of a leaflet?

- **To persuade** someone to visit your attraction or place
- **To inform** someone about the key attractions, features or places

Key features of a leaflet



- **Title**
- **Sub-headings**
- **Introduction** – welcoming message, what is the purpose of this leaflet?
- **Imperative language** – giving the reader a direct command !
- **Key facts and information**
- **Direct Language** – use 'you' or 'your'
- **Rhetorical question**
- **Exaggeration** – making a big deal out of something
- **Eye-catching images**

Recap writing skills for leaflets

- **Prepositional phrase:** A sentence in which something is referred to in relation to where or when something else is.
- **Example:** Next to the main stage, you can find the stand-up comedy tent.
- **Expanded noun phrase:** A 'described' noun: article + adjective + noun
- **Examples:** The spectacular event, a colourful site, the talented class...

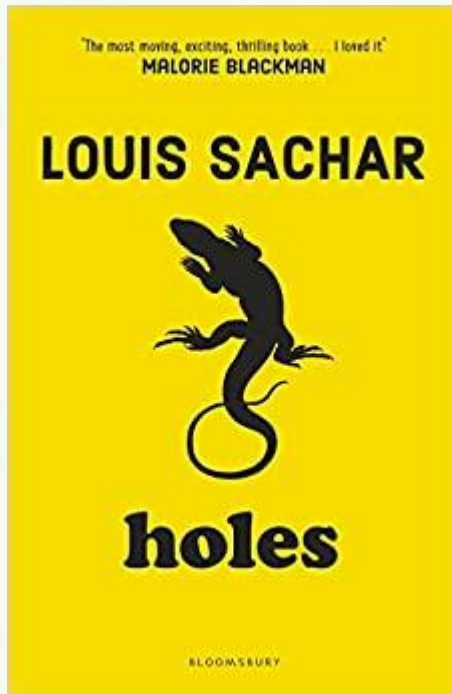

The Hippie Movement



Who are Hippies?

- A hippie is a member of a counterculture, originally a youth movement that began in the United States during the mid-1960s and spread to other countries around the world.
- The word hippie came from hipster and was used to describe people who moved into New York City's Greenwich Village and San Francisco's district.



Beliefs of Hippies

- Hippies were strongly against the Vietnam War, nuclear weapons and war in general
- They were against mainstream society and the government itself, for its control over people's lives
- Hippies believed in peace, love, community, respect for the environment and rock-n-roll. They believed everyone should be calm at all times, which stems from the Eastern belief of Zen.
- Zen means peaceful and calm and refers to a state of meditation



The Role of Festivals in The Hippie Culture

- In 1967, hippie culture really took off - the 'Summer of Love' began on the West Coast of the United States, and the 1969 Woodstock Festival.
- In the UK in 1970, many gathered at the gigantic Isle of Wight Festival with a crowd of around 400,000 people.
- Mobile "peace convoys" made summer pilgrimages to free music festivals to promote the hippie movement
- In Australia, hippies gathered at Nimbin for the 1973 Aquarius Festival.
- "Piedra Roja Festival", a major hippie event in Chile, was held in 1970.

Flower Children

- The summer of 1967, or the 'Summer of Love' was a significant widespread social and political gathering that took place in San Francisco.
- It is remembered well because it was the cultural centre of the hippie movement.
- From this event the 'flower' became a major American symbol of the hippie culture.
- People from all over started to question the social norms and practices in which they grew up, with the intention to defy conforming to the 'norms' of general society
- **What do you think about conforming to society? Is it okay to be different? Should we still follow the rules and the law?**



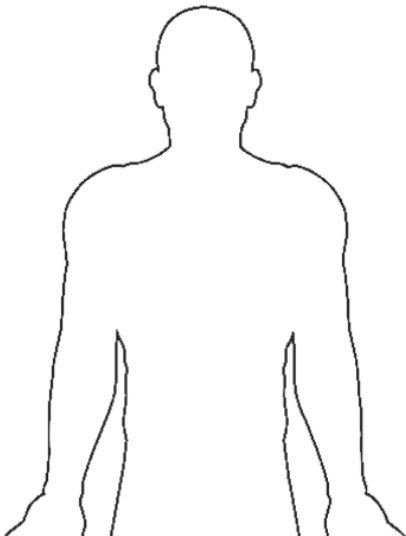
How has The Hippie Movement influenced our world today?

- Hippie fashion and values had a major effect on culture, influencing popular music, television, film, literature, and the arts.
- Due to the hippie movement, we now have acceptance of multiple personal lifestyle choices including acceptance of unmarried couples, rights of homosexual, bisexual and transsexuals.
- The Hippie Movement had an impact on many more Americans becoming 'anti-war' – this is one of the reasons for the peace symbol of which is seen as representing hippies
