When we are thinking about jobs and money, there are some words that will be very useful to understand:

Job - a position of employment.

Employment - if you are employed this means you have a job.

Wages - money you get paid to do your job. This is normally a set amount for a certain period of time.

Salary - the amount you earn from your job over a year.

Where do people get their money from?


When people have jobs they get paid money.

This will be paid to them on a certain date, sometimes each week but usually at the end of a month. The money people get for doing a job is called their wages. If they have a job, they are 'employed'.




