Welcome back, I hope you have all had a wonderful May half term, it certainly looked like the children enjoyed the nice weather, we are slowly but surely working our way through sharing the photos. I cannot believe that I am starting to write for the final term of the year. The children have been absolutely fantastic and have made this year such a joy for all of the staff in the Early Years team and for each other. Warmer weather

As we enter the summer term and we get this glorious weather, children will be spending more and more time in our outdoor area as I am a true believer that children learn best in all different kinds of environments so with this in mind we will typically start to have maths & literacy lessons outside along with access to our outdoor continuous provision, with this in mind please can I ask that all children have sun cream applied before the beginning of school if it looks like it will be a particularly warm day. Having 31 children to sun cream can be time consuming. As you have all signed our sunscreen policy at the beginning of the year you will be aware that school is allowed to supervise and assist where necessary and we have a spare bottle to top up in cases where the children have run out.

It is lovely to see all the things the children are achieving at home and they really love sharing them with the rest of the class. Please let me know if you run out and we can issue more, we tend to add 5 every other week to the children's bags.

REMINDERS

School uniform is compulsory – please make sure it is named. The children will be using the outside area on a daily basis, so please make sure your child has a coat and is dressed appropriately for the colder, wetter weather. Children must wear suitable footwear for school. Crocs, jelly shoes and flip flops must not be worn, as these do not provide supp ort when children are running at playtimes.

The children's books and book bags need to be in school each day so we get the opportunity to read with them. If you lose the school reading book a replacement will cost ± 5.00 and the reading record ± 2.00 and these can be purchased at the school office.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development	This half term we will be thinking about how we are all different. We will think about what we are good at and what our friends are good at, as well as learning about taking turns. Set and work towards simple goals. We will do this through circle time games, class discussions and modelling these key skills to the children.	Reinforce expected behaviour in the home setting. Discuss th consequences of inappropriate behaviour/actions. Great opportunities for these 'WOW Moments' can the chil- dren try new activities e.g. riding a bike/scooter, swimming other sports. Can they try new foods (we are always encour- aging this at lunchtime in school) Manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs.			
Physical Development	On Mondays, the children will take part Twinkl PE 'The Olympics children will learn to move and balance like dif- ferent jungle animals. They will be experimenting with moving around, under, through and over small and large equipment. Finally, they will be creating their own gymnas- tic sequence. During this terms Tuesdays PE sessions, we will be outside in preparation for sports day activities, e.g. Running, Egg & Spoon races. Combine different movements with ease and fluency this will be focused on our outdoor provision as well as during PE lessons. Children will also continue to develop the foundations of a handwriting style which is fast, accurate and efficient.	During our P.E sessions we encourage all children to do as much as they can themselves then with guidance we 'show them' when they need help. Continued support with their throwing and catching skills, practising to move to smaller tennis balls. Catching Home Learning Challenge Sheet At school we are learning to catch different objects. Please help me at home. This is what we need to do to become good catchers. Activities to Support Learning Creative Catch Play catch with anything soft you can find. A ball can often be scary when you are learning to catch. You could use a balloon, a tea towel, a scarf, a soft toy, a ball of wool or a screwed-up piece of paper. Counting Catch Using a soft object, count how many times you can throw and catch the object without dropping it. Record the result and keep trying to beat the score. This could be done with a partner or individually.

Express their ideas and feelings about their experiences using full sentences, including use of past, present and future tenses and making use of conjunctions, with modelling and support from their teacher. Children will continue to develop their writing skills, working on words, phrases and sen- tences.
